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## Astoria lands \$400k for Heritage cleanup



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The **Environmental Protection Agency** is giving money to Astoria, and eight other cities, to redevelop contaminated properties.

Astoria will share in the \$9 million worth of EPA Brownfields redevelopment funding that EPA announced on Thursday.

The north Oregon Coast city will use the EPA's \$400,000 to assess properties and clean-up measures.

The grant will help city officials work on <u>the Heritage Square site</u>. The spot used to be home to an auto repair shop, a dry cleaner and a printer. Astoria wants to reshape the space as an outdoor gathering space that includes an amphitheater and a boardwalk.

It will also include the "Garden of Surging Waves," which will give a nod to Astoria's Chinese heritage.

"Astoria has a rich and diverse social history, populated with a variety of ethnic groups, many of which are honored elsewhere in the community," the EPA wrote in its release announcing the grant. "But until now, Astoria's early Chinese history has remained obscure. When fishing and fish canneries were two of Astoria's primary industries, Chinese men were a key part of the cannery workforce."

The EPA estimates that there are 450,000 abandoned and contaminated waste sites in

America. The agency's Brownfields program seeks to redevelop such sites. <u>EPA has sent cities and states \$18.3 billion</u> through the program since 1995.
